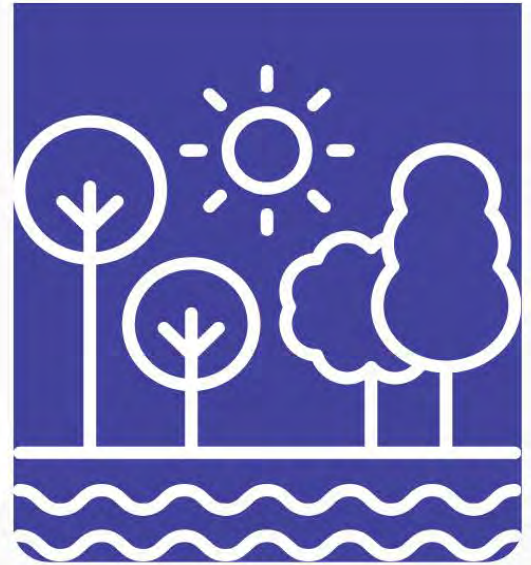

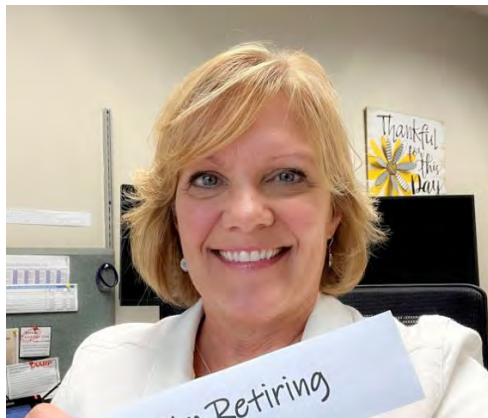
Parks and Recreation staff is looking forward to another productive year and excited to serve the community for all of their recreational need. Cheers to 2023!

Lakeville Lions Donation

As part of the construction of Avonlea Community Park, a splash pad will be included. The Lakeville Lions pledged \$500,000 to the construction of the splash pad. Thank you to the Lakeville Lions for their ongoing support of Parks and Recreation projects and programs!



Casperson Park Improvements

A number of projects were completed at Casperson Park and boat launch this past year. Perhaps most notable was the addition of a band shell and performance stage. Design work started in late May of 2022 and was completed in September. Staff is currently developing programming for this new amenity and it will be available for some private rentals as well. The structure is located near Shelter A and will utilize the natural slope of the park for seating. Seating capacity for the performance stage will be between 625-950.

Parking lot improvements were also completed, these improvements included the reconstruction of the boat launch parking lot and south upper lot. The improvements will improve traffic flow and accessibility to the boat launch. A camera that will provide real time updates of traffic at the boat launch will also be installed and will allow park users to monitor how busy the boat launch is from day to day.

Lastly, reconstruction of the boat launch was completed in late fall. One ramp remained open for the duration of the construction.

Ritter Farm Park Cabin Improvements

As part of the 2021 Park Bond Referendum, funding was approved to improve and expand the historic cabin located at Ritter Farm Park. Staff partnered with consultants and contractors throughout the year designing the building schematics and choosing interior and exterior features.

The restored cabin will become the new Environmental Learning Center and provide a space for educational programs, expanded nature programming and more. The project is set to be completed this spring with transition into the new building occurring in summer 2023.



Antlers Community Park Improvements

Plans and specifications for the Antlers Community Park improvement project were finalized, this project is also being funded through the 2021 Park Bond Referendum. Staff worked with consultants on the design of a new community building that will include a kitchen and meeting room. Other improvements to the park include expanded shelter options, a food truck pad and parking area, play equipment and more. Lakeville Brewing Company will also have a food service operation at the site.

Removal of the playground, shelters and other amenities was completed in late 2022 and construction will commence in 2023!

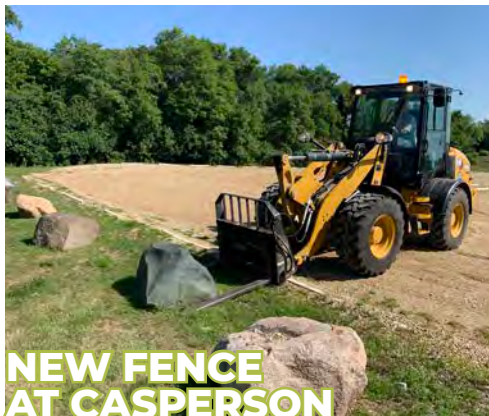

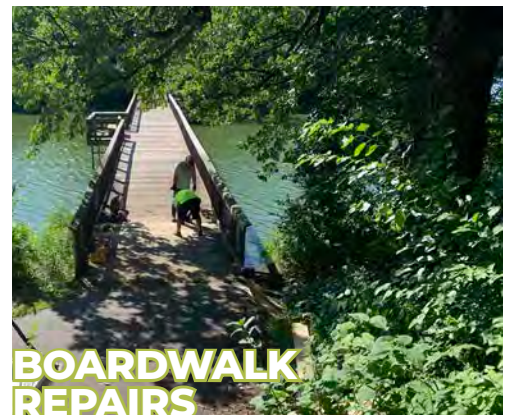

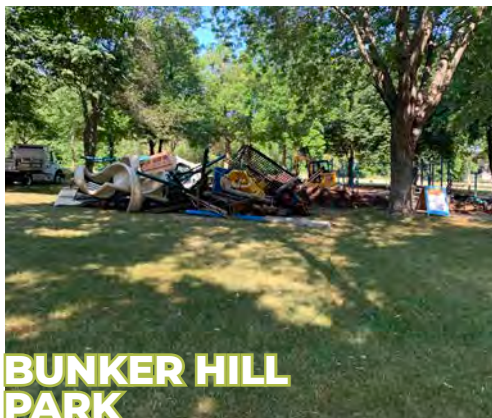


Playground Replacements

- A record 132 ticketed events were held in 2022.
- Theater and rental revenue rebounds to pre-pandemic numbers.

Staff opened ten rink sites for the 21-22 skating season. Rinks officially opened on December 23 with 62 average days open. Snow and extreme cold closed the rinks on 3 occasions, the season came to a close on February 27. Very cold days over the course of the season resulted in good ice conditions into late February.

Hosted at Ritter Farm Park, this program allows members of the community to participate in the important process of marking individual birds for identification. This allows scientists to collect research about migration, lifespans, behavior and population growth.



This is a cooperative program with Environmental Resources staff. Participants explore the wildlife in water and on the prairie.



New in 2022, pickleball leagues were offered in addition to expanded lessons and tournaments. Pickleball remains a popular offering.



With the assistance of Lakeville Fire and Police departments, participants learn about fire, water, electrical safety, self-defense, crosswalk safety and more.



Thanks to the coordinated efforts of Recreation Staff and the Lakeville Friends of the Environment volunteers, this year's ride saw outstanding turnout with 78 riders. The tour was 18-miles and started at Pioneer Plaza.

- The Heritage Center is now home to a beautiful new sculpture out front entitled "Spreading Our Wings."

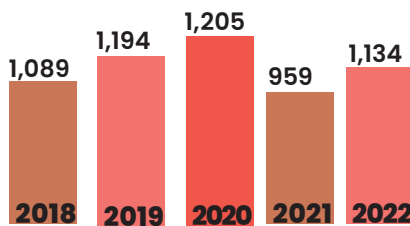
