

Fats → Oils → Grease = FOG

COOKING OIL AND GREASE – LARD – BUTTER/MARGARINE – MEAT FATS – SHORTENING – SAUCES – ICING – BATTERS – DRESSINGS – DAIRY PRODUCTS

FOG poured or washed down the drain into the sanitary sewer system clings to pipe walls and builds up over time, blocking the flow of wastewater exiting the home or business. The most effective way to limit maintenance on homeowner's sanitary sewer service and city sewer mains is to prevent FOG from entering the system.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF FOG

1. Food residue containing Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG) should be disposed of in the trash. **NEVER** down the drain or toilet.
2. Store grease in a container. Let it harden; then dispose of it in the trash.
3. Wipe FOG residue from pans with a paper towel before washing and put the towel in the trash, or scrape FOG residue into the trash using a spatula and wash the spatula with the pans.
4. Place a strainer in the kitchen sink drain to catch food scraps and other solids. Empty the strainer into the trash.

Good Sewer Practices

~KEEP IT FLOWING~

1. The proper care and feeding of your sewer system can help avoid problems.
2. Coffee grounds, eggshells, and most cooking residue can be composted or should go in the garbage. Meat, cheese, bones, and dairy products should not be composted.
3. Cat litter, diapers, baby wipes, cleaning wipes, hair, cigarettes, cotton balls, q-tips, paper towels, and tissues all belong in the trash; not down the toilet or sink.
4. Old medicines **SHOULD NOT** be put in the trash or down the drain. Lakeville Police Department is one of several drug drop-off locations. For more information call 952-985-4400 or visit:
